Dear Kerby Families,

Happy New Year! Now that the holidays are behind us and we are beginning a new year, it is a great time to think about goal setting with your children. Using the information you received from your child's teacher at conferences, as well as their first report card, children as young as Kindergarten can sit down with an adult to create academic, behavior, or personal goals to focus on over the coming months. Creating goals with your child will help them to take ownership of their progress and encourage them to self-monitor in the months to come. Also, writing the goals down and displaying them in a prominent place at home so you can discuss them periodically will help the children to take responsibility for the goals they selected.

As you sit down to begin to discuss possible goal areas, here are some questions you may want to consider discussing with your child:

Academic Goals:

- What at school makes you feel best about yourself as a student?
- What would you like to accomplish this year in reading, writing, math, etc.?
- Is there a subject area in which you don't feel as motivated to succeed?
- What are you doing at home that helps you be more successful at school?

Behavior/Social Goals:

- How do you feel your behavior at school has been so far this year?
- Do you try to be a Kerby "fresh fish" every day?
- Is there a particular time of day that it is more difficult for you than others?
- Could you be better organized with your school materials?
- Are you a good friend to ALL students at Kerby?

Personal Goals

- When you aren't in school, what makes you feel the happiest (are you most passionate about)?
- Would you like to get better at a sport, instrument, dance, etc.?
- Are you respectful to siblings/friends/parents?
- Do you treat others as you would like to be treated?

There are great places to start when beginning the discussion of goals with your child. Once the 2018 goals have been set, it would be beneficial to revisit them regularly, check in with your kids on their progress, and modify or change them as necessary. Feel free to ask me if you have any questions or would like more information on goal setting with elementary-aged kids.

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Guidelines to Follow for Students Who Are Out III

Monkey Word School Adventure - Age 5+ iPhone, iPod Touch, iPad, Android | \$1.99

This is an early-reading app for preschoolers and young elementary-school-age kids. It's the next step up from THUP's <u>Monkey Preschool Lunchbox</u>, which focuses on colors and sorting. <u>Monkey Word School Adventure</u> is for kids who are ready to start recognizing letters and words. It is well-designed with young learners in mind, challenging kids age 4 to 7 by using technology that quickly adjusts the words to the appropriate level.



<u>Farfaria Story Books</u> - Age 4+

iPhone, iPod Touch, iPad, Android, Fire Phone, Kindle Fire | Free for first month

This app contains a digital library of over 1,000 ebooks for kids, with new books added each week. Parents and kids can browse the books by genre and within each genre can search by title, release date, and reading level. The format of the books are simple, with illustrations and text boxes on each page. Kids can chose to read the books themselves, listen to them read on auto-play, or read along. After a free trial, parents need to subscribe on a monthly, yearly, or lifetime basis.



Weirdwood Manor - Age 8+iPad | \$2.99

This app is an interactive fantasy storybook that follows three remarkable children as they're invited to the home of a mysterious benefactor. One character has been removed from several foster families after mysterious things have happened to him. Since each additional chapter costs another \$2.99 and the premium package is \$8.99, parents will need to decide how much to invest ahead of time.





Young Fives Program:

The Grosse Pointe Public School System's Young Fives Program is free for younger five-year-old children residing within the Grosse Pointe Public attendance boundaries. It is a full-day program that includes age appropriate instruction in all common core subjects. Students will participate in music, art, physical education and library.

What is the Young Fives Program?

Young Fives program offers an alternative for children whose parents feel that they are not yet ready for a traditional kindergarten experience. Students who participate and complete the Young Fives program would be expected to return to their home school the following year.

Who is eligible?

Families that live within the district may apply to one of the identified schools offering Young Fives. Eligibility for the Young Fives is determined by birthdate--your child must turn five between March 1 and December 1, 2018.

What happens after my children completes Young Fives?

The natural progression from Young Fives program would be Kindergarten at your home school. If a student meets the Kindergarten social, emotional, and academic expectations at the conclusion of the Young Fives program then they will work with their teacher and building principal regarding 1st grade placement for the following year. These decisions will be made on an individualized basis.

How do I enroll my child?

Families enroll through the GPPSS residency office by 4/13/2018. If needed, a lottery drawing for the program will be held on 4/16/2018. For more information, please visit our website www.gpschools.org or call 313-432-3083.
