Dear Kerby Parents,

As we are now well into the school year, we are busy teaching your children many things here at school. Much of which is academic content; however, you would be surprised at how many other lessons teachers squeeze into a school day. Often we find ourselves teaching kids to tie shoes or zip a coat. We also teach kids to be kind and handle conflict. I know that all teachers and parents want our children to be independently successful. It might seem next to impossible to start teaching these types of skills to a 5 or 6 year old. Here are a few tips to help teach independence to your children starting at home.

Identify opportunities for tasks that your children can begin to do themselves such as pack their lunch, get their backpack ready, get themselves dressed, tie their own shoes, etc. Teaching small levels of independence will go a long way at home and at school.

Teach your children to advocate for themselves. It is very easy to sweep in and solve your children's problems for them by emailing their teacher or talking to a peer's parents. However, you are teaching a much more valuable life skill when you coach them into doing it for themselves. Give your child language to use so they can tell their teacher if they don't like their seat placement or would like a second chance at an assignment. Practice conversations that they could have with a friend if they are upset. These life skills will continue to help them far beyond elementary school.

Don't expect your children's way to be perfect. Your children might not tie their shoes as tight as you do or they might write their book title sloppier than you on their reading log. But, allowing them to make those mistakes teaches a level of independence they will never learn if you continue take their pencil and write their book title for them. Let your child make mistakes. They are an opportunity to learn.

Leave extra time to complete tasks. It is natural to want to take over if you are late or short on time. Allowing 10 extra minutes to get ready in the morning will lessen the morning arguments and allow your child to do more independently.

Let them walk into school themselves. A great way to allow a child to show independence is to allow them to walk into school without a parent. They learn to be brave and to organize their materials independently. Often children are less emotional and more able to be independent without a parent nearby. We encourage all children to enter Kerby independently in the morning!

I look forward to hearing about all of the ways you try to promote independence and risk-taking with your children over the remainder of the school year. If you have a story to share, feel free to reach out at any time.

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ASK THE PRINCIPAL! → Should I lock my bike when I arrive at school?

→ What time do students need to be at Kerby ready to learn?


Please remember that the bell rings at 8:20 A.M. Tuesday through Friday and at 9:05 A.M. on Monday. Students are expected to be in their classrooms and ready to learn five minutes following the bell. Students have optimal learning time when present and prepared. If your child is tardy for school, please make sure you walk them into the school and directly into the office. This will assist us with accountability of the children. We appreciate your help in this matter!

→ Why are there reserved parking spots in the Kerby lot?

There are several reserved parking spots in the Kerby front parking lot for traveling teachers who come with in the morning or afternoon to teach. Please do not park in the reserved spots at any time. Also, please join us in being good neighbors and do not pull into driveways across from Kerby School.

→ What should children wear to school now that the weather is changing?

Falling leaves and falling temperatures mean it's time to put away the sandals and shorts and time to get out some cold weather gear. Students go outside every day unless the weather is truly horrible. Please make sure that your child wears a jacket or coat to school in the morning. If it warms up above 60 degrees students may go outside without their jackets or coats. Please also send an extra sweater or sweatshirt to keep at school. And it's not too early to send a pair of gloves and hat. November weather is very unpredictable!



I hope that you will continue to encourage them to review their vocabulary at home. I love the Duolingo app and the Epic! reading app (which has Spanish stories)! There are countless more free Spanish games and activities if you check the app store. Students may also enjoy watching movies and cartoons that they already love in Spanish! I also highly recommend family field trips to local restaurants and the Detroit Institute of Arts for some cultural fun. Finally, you can always check out our website at http://sragrattan.weebly.com/, where students will find many of their favorite songs and materials from this rotation.

3rd graders have been studying greetings, courtesy, numbers 1-30 for age, emotions, descriptive vocabulary, and Mexican artist Frida Kahlo. We will be finishing up this rotation with lessons on the monarch butterfly migration to Mexico, and the Spanish alphabet.

4th graders have been working on weather, dates, and large numbers. We are now tying in our weather I vocabulary with a unit on Peru, clothing, and marketplaces.

5th graders had an introduction to the culture and history of Spain to start the year. We recently finished comparing and contrasting the hobbies and sports that we enjoy with those of Spain. We are finishing our rotation with a unit on family, birthdays, and other celebrations in Spanish-speaking countries.


1st Place - Mrs. Briggs' Grade 1

I hope all of my Kerby parents are enjoying the emails from Artsonia when I upload your child's finished art projects! I LOVE knowing your day will be brighter when you get to share in your child's latest creation. (I will be photographing a backlog of fall artwork soon.)

We are off to a great start this year in the Art Room at Kerby! We are learning about the **Elements of Art (Line, Shape, Color, Texture, Space, Form and Value)** and how to thoughtfully implement them when creating our art work. We are also exploring some Fabulous Autumn themed projects, brand new this year. These are turning out beautifully, and with amazing color! In the next few weeks, each grade will be creating Winter themed art work. I will publish these to Artsonia as soon as they are completed, so those of you who would like to order them printed on Holiday cards may do so. See below to find out what each grade has been or will be creating.

Kindergarten: We have finished up our Mouse Paint project on color mixing, and finished our Silly Face Pumpkins (which, by the way, are HILARIOUS)! We will soon be starting our Printmaking project - making Snowflakes- where we talk a lot about symmetry.

1st Grade: We have finished up Matisse, and are now wrapping up our explorations of contour line, pattern, and color with our Hot Air Balloon project. We will be starting our winter scene - creating a snowman in a blizzard.

2nd Grade: We finished our exploration of artist Frank Stella with a drawing that turned into a Sculpture, and are starting our "Winter Birch Trees" project – one of my FAVORITES!

3rd Grade: We have finished our detailed patterns and painting on our large Alebrije Owls, and are now working on our new "Skiing Snowman." This one is hysterical. I am so proud of how hard each kiddo has worked on their snowman! Next we will be exploring Central and South American folk art.

4th Grade: We have wrapped up our Cubism project with Pablo Picasso. Ask your child what made the Cubism style so special. Next, we will be working on our winter scene!


5th Grade: We finished our Elements of Art booklets and dramatic landscape drawing of Pumpkins at Midnight, using Chalk pastels. This is a great drawing where we can demonstrate our understanding of the art elements: Space (foreground, middle, and background); Value (light, medium, and dark ranges within a color). Next, we will begin our Winter Woodland Scene.
