### KINDERGARTEN 2017 / 2018

In Michigan, according to Public Act 198 of 2012, children must be <u>FIVE YEARS OF AGE ON OR BEFORE SEPTEMBER 1</u>, 2017, TO REGISTER FOR THE 2017-18 SCHOOL YEAR. Parents of children who turn five years of age after September 1 but on or before December 1, may still register their child for kindergarten next year if they notify the district in writing using the kindergarten entry age waiver form available in the kindergarten registration packet.

### **DRILLS & PROCEDURES**

State law requires schools to conduct a specific number of emergency drills (tornado, fire, lockdown) during the school year. These drills are typically unannounced. The city works with the school on all of these drills and a police presence is expected.

### **PBIS CELEBRATION - FEBRUARY**

The monthly incentive party for this month is "Free Choice in Computer Lab." Students will be able to choose an appropriate activity in the computer lab.

The goal of the monthly PBIS (Positive Behavior Instructional Support) Party is to recognize positive behavior around the school.

Research shows that students achieve at a higher level when they know the expectations and feel safe. Positive Behavior Support helps us improve on both these areas. We want students to feel good about themselves and come to school happy and ready to learn!

### Women's History Month is a great time to read a biography

arch is Women's History Month—the perfect time for your child to read a biography about a famous woman. Help her select a biography she will enjoy by talking with her about her interests.

If your child likes:

- · Sports, she might like to read about Wilma Rudolph, a threetime Olympic gold medal winner.
- Science, she may be interested in learning about Marie Curie, the only person to win a Nobel Prize in two different scienceschemistry and physics.
- · Politics, she might like to read about Victoria Woodhull, who in 1870 became the first woman to run for president.

- · Fashion, she might like to read about Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, who was considered a cultural and fashion icon in the 1960s.
- · Helping others, she might like to learn more about Mother Teresa, who dedicated her life to serving the poor and disadvantaged.

Whatever your child's interests, there is sure to be a biography she might enjoy reading. Ask the librarian for help if you don't see a book that catches her interest right away.

Read the book with your child or let her read it on her own, but don't stop there. Encourage her to do some additional research on the person and share what she finds out.

### This four-step process can end procrastination



At one time or another, most kids put off doing their homework. But when procras-

tination becomes a habit, it can affect school performance.

To help your child break the procrastination habit, have him:

- 1. Select just one thing to do. Sometimes kids put things off when they feel overwhelmed. Tell your child to focus on one assignment at a time.
- 2. Set a timer for 30 minutes and begin working on the assignment. While the timer is ticking, he should focus only on that assignment.
- 3. Avoid breaks. Your child should get water or a snack before he starts the timer so he doesn't interrupt his work flow.
- 4. Reward himself. Once the timer goes off, encourage your child to do something he likes, such as playing an online game for a few minutes. Have your child repeat this

process until his assignment is complete!

### **Pointers Fom a Parking Lot Parent**

Mrs. Heather Bresser is on duty almost every day for two times during the day, helping our children remain safe during drop off and pick up. She volunteers her time, and we are most grateful for her assistance!

Below are her thoughts to help our procedures run even more smoothly.

Dear Maire community,

I so appreciate the patience and respect that has dominated our parking area this year! It has been a joy to be out welcoming our children and keeping them safe. Here are a few ways you can help to keep our drop off lane a pleasant and safe place:

- \* Pull as far forward as you can in the drop off lane before stopping to let your child(ren) out, especially if you are in the rush that often happens between 8:15 and 8:25.
- \* Aim for drop off at 8:10, instead of 8:20. Not only might you miss some of the rush, but your child gets an extra bit of play time with friends before settling behind the desk!
- \* When you get the email from the office requesting help during a two week period, pick a morning and come help open doors. It seems like a little thing, but it makes a big difference having an adult there to assist with heavy doors and back packs. Thank you to those who already to this, and many thanks to Kathy for jumping in to help so often!
- \* Wait until you have reached the drop off zone (after the crosswalk along the painted curb) to let your child(ren) out of the car. This is another one that seems like a little thing but carries big repercussions both in time and patience for those behind you.
- \* If you know your child needs help getting out of the car, please park in the parking lot and assist him or her. While I and other volunteers are happy to help, there are many times that we are physically unable to get to all of those needing help in a timely manner. If you suspect you will need to get out of the car to help your child, please make a practice of parking in the parking lot until your child is able to manage his or her seatbelt and opening the door.
- \* Similarly, if you know you still have things to discuss with your child, please do that in the parking lot, not the drop off lane.
- \* Please make every effort to wait patiently in the drop off line and avoid the temptation to pass stopped cars and pull in ahead of them.
- \* If someone else is responsible for dropping off or picking up your child(ren), please help them understand our parking lot procedures.
- \* And, finally, please be extra careful to follow procedures and practice patience on rainy or snowy days. The worse the weather, the more we need caution and cooperation!

Thank you for working together and doing those little things that make Maire a safer and happier place!






### Read-aloud favorites

■ Biblioburro: A True Story from Colombia (Jeanette Winter)

to your neighborhood on the back of a donkey? This is the



true story of a Colombian schoolteacher's traveling library, which brought books to children in remote villages. (Also available in Spanish.)

■ Dragons Love Tacos (Adam Rubin) When a little boy discovers that dragons like to eat tacos, he decides to



host a taco party for them. But if a fire-breathing dragon accidentally gets a bite of spicy salsa, look out! A silly

story about a dragon party that turns into a disaster.

- Just a Second (Steve Jenkins) In just 1 second, a bumblebee flaps its wings 100 times and the earth travels  $18\frac{1}{2}$  miles. This nonfiction book will help your child think about time in fascinating ways. She'll also discover different methods of measuring time.
- Bedtime Is Canceled (Cece Meng) Maggie and her brother write their parents an official-looking note: "Bedtime is canceled." Somehow, the note blows out the window, lands in a newspaper office, and ends up in a headline. Soon, bedtime really is canceled, and exhausted children quickly discover the importance of sleep.

### Time for a story

Want to spend time with your youngster, build her reading skills, and help her learn to love books? You can do all three when you read aloud to her. Here are some suggestions.

### Read regularly

Try to read to your child every day. You might aim for 10-15 minutes of bedtime reading for a peaceful end to the day. Bring along

a book, and read to her during a sibling's sports practice. Or curl up together with a book when you get home from work.



Your youngster may want to hear old favorites again and again. Use your turn for new titles and variety (nonfiction, poetry).

### Let her participate

Ask your child to turn the pages while you read. Also, she can finish sentences that rhyme or fill in words she knows.

Go slowly so she has time to understand the story and look at the illustrations. She'll enjoy read-aloud time more if she plays an active role.



You can use different voices for different characters (a high, squeaky voice for a mouse or a deep, booming voice for a horse). Or substitute your youngster's name for the main character's name, and use family members' names for other characters. Note: You don't have to be an expert reader—your child will love it when you read aloud because it's you.♥

### Writing that makes sense

When a child first learns to write, his stories may not always make sense to others. Help his writing flow logically with these two ideas.


**1.** Even if your youngster isn't writing sentences yet, he can tell you stories. As he describes the new class pet or something funny that happened at lunch, you can jot down his tale.


He'll practice relating events in a logical order, and that can help when he puts his thoughts and ideas down on paper himself.


2. Let your child read his stories to you. Ask questions to encourage him to add information ("What did you do with your friends at recess?") or to clear up a confusing part ("Who said, 'Let's go home'—you, or your brother?").♥


