- Q. Do the students stay in for recess if it is cold outside?
- A. Maire students go outdoors for recess two times each day throughout the school year unless it is raining hard or the wind chill is below zero degrees Fahrenheit.

Please be sure that your child leaves for school dressed properly for the weather EVERY DAY. It is very possible that students might not have lunch recess but will have their afternoon recess and should be prepared. All students must have boots and snowpants to play on the wood chips or playfield once the snow is on the playground—otherwise they must stay on the blacktop. Students should NOT throw snow or ice crystals while on Maire grounds. This will help all the students enjoy the joy of snow. We also ask that you write your child's name on his/her gloves, hats, boots and coat. Our Lost and Found quickly fills up!

JUMP ROPE FOR HEART—P.E. NEWS

In early February, Maire will be hosting a "Jump Rope for Heart" fundraising event during your child's P.E. class. Every year, millions of elementary students across the country jump rope to raise money for the American Heart Association. The funds that are raised from these events contribute to all the vital research and programs made possible by the American Heart Associa-

IMPORTANT TRAFFIC LANE INFO

With the cold and snowy weather of the past weeks the amount of our parking lot traffic increased dramatically. Only with the cooperation of EVERY driver can the traffic lane be kept moving and delays kept to a minimum.

Please review the following tips and guidelines regarding the morning drop-off:

- As a courtesy to the cars behind you, always pull up as far as possible along the redpainted curb, even when it's rainy or cold.
- Make sure your child(ren) are ready to leave the car with all his / her belongings once you pull up into the parking lot. This will cut down on the time he or she needs to get out of the car.
- Try to leave home a little earlier in the winter to allow for more time to get to school and to get through the traffic lane. 5 10 minutes doesn't sound like much, but it will make a big difference!
- How about carpooling? If you know a family that lives on the same block or close to you, try to carpool once in a while. It will reduce the number of cars in the traffic lane, will save gas and will benefit the environment.
- Best of all, of course, would be to walk to school! A little early-morning walk in the brisk weather will ensure your child(ren) gets a good dose of fresh air and they will arrive at school awake and ready to learn!

KINDERGARTEN 2017 / 2018

In Michigan, according to Public Act 198 of 2012, children must be <u>FIVE YEARS OF AGE ON</u> OR BEFORE <u>SEPTEMBER 1</u>, 2017, TO REGISTER <u>FOR THE 2017-18 SCHOOL YEAR</u>. Parents of children who turn five years of age after September 1 but on or before December 1, may still register their child for kindergarten next year if they notify the district in writing using the kindergarten entry age waiver form available in the kindergarten registration packet.

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

We are already in the process of registering students for Kindergarten in the Fall for 2017/18 school year.

Looking ahead to the <u>Transition to Kindergarten</u> event, **May 2, 2017,** please register by **April 25th.**

TRY A NEW STRATEGY TO IMPROVE CONVERSATIONS WITH YOUR CHILD

Are you tired of asking your child questions about school and getting little response? Then try this strategy.

Instead of asking your child lots of questions when he gets home from school, tell him five things about your day first. For example:

- 1. I've had such a busy day.
- 2. I went to the library this morning to get some books.
- 3. Then I met Grandma for lunch.
- 4. We went to buy Rachel a present.
- 5. It was good to get home.

After you've finished, say "Tell me a little bit about your day." Avoid asking questions that can be answered with a simple yes or no. Instead, say things like, "What was the best part of your day?" or "Tell me about what you learned today."

You can also use this strategy to start discussions about schoolwork. If your child brings home a pic-

ture from school, look at it and make five observations about what you see. Comment on the colors. Say what you like about it. Tell what it reminds you of, etc. Then ask your child, "What does it mean to you?"

"To listen well is as powerful a means of communication and influence as to talk well."




PARENT REMINDERS

Privacy concerns as well as protecting our student learning time prohibit teachers' involvement.

Research shows that students achieve at a higher level when they know the expectations and feel safe. Positive Behavior Support helps us improve on both these areas.

We want students to feel good about themselves and come to school happy and ready to learn!

It Matters: Reading

Be a reading role model to build reading interest



Children who see their parents reading are often more motivated to read themselves. To show your child that

reading matters to you:

- Let her see you reading every day. Pick up a newspaper, book or magazine. Your child will see that you choose to read, and will want to read, too.
- Tell her why you are reading—
 for information, to double-check
 something you think you know.
 Or you may be reading just for
 pure enjoyment.
- Look up a word in the dictionary if you come across one you are unsure of. Ask your child if she knows the meaning of the word.
- Read aloud to her. When you come across something you think your child might find interesting, read a small part of it to her. She may be motivated to finish reading the article herself.
- Use your library card. When you take your child to the library, find something to check out for yourself.
- Join her. When you see your child reading, pick up something to read yourself and make a snack to share.
- Give books as gifts. Show her that books are special by giving them as gifts. Encourage your child to give her friends books as gifts, too.
- Ask relatives to support her reading habits, too. They can record themselves reading a book to your child.

Show your child how reading is connected to so many things!

Reading opens the doors to a world of information and enjoyment. That's why it's essential to help your child understand the value of reading and how it connects to so many things in his life and in the word.

Reading is essential for:

- Obtaining information. People learn about rules, directions, facts and more. Have your child read a recipe to you as you cook. Read a manual aloud that explains how to put something together. Challenge your child to read to find answers to questions, such as "How can I get this grass stain out of your shirt?"
- Communication. Talk with your child about the ways reading helps you communicate with others—through mail, email, texts and notes. Then suggest



that your child exchange letters with a long-distance friend. Or perhaps he could write an email to a local politician about an issue that's important to him.

 Pleasure. Help your child plan a relaxing end-of-the-day reading routine. And be sure to help him find books that will give him a good laugh or take him on an exciting adventure.

Why not include reading in your New Year's resolutions?



The new calendar year offers the opportunity to think about the past and set goals for the future. This includes

family reading goals!

Take time with your child to:

- Review favorite books or stories from the past year. If the books are nearby, look through them together. Have your child choose his three favorites. Ask, "What was the best part of this story? Why?" Or, "What is your favorite picture in this book?"
- Discuss future reading plans.
 How much time are family members spending on reading for pleasure? Are there ways you and your child can improve your reading habits? Together, write any ideas or goals you may have. Post them in a place where you will see them often.
- Plan to read new things. In addition to books, suggest your child read magazines, newspapers, cookbooks, catalogs—anything and everything he can get his hands on!

PARKING LOT DROP OFF / PICK UP PROCEDURES

Please read and follow these procedures when dropping off or picking up children:

- Drop off / pick up children using the drop off / pick zone in the parking lot, pulling forward as far as possible.
- NO PARKING in the drop off/pick up lane. Stay in vehicles only. DO NOT PARK AND LEAVE YOUR VEHICLE UNATTENDED.
- Vehicles should not be stopped in the outer by-pass lane to drop off students.
- Parents MUST hold children's hands in parking lot. Students should never walk between cars to get to the sidewalk.
- Right turn ONLY in and out of the parking lot.
- Cars left unattended on Waterloo WILL be ticketed.
- Park cars on nearby streets if necessary and walk over to retrieve your children.
- Make sure that you and students cross at the crossing-guard corners.
- Never cross mid-block, especially at Loraine.
- Do not use the alley or Cadieux for drop off/pick up.
- Parking spots at the alley are reserved for Preschool and handicapped use.
- Try to carpool with other parents.
- Even better, encourage your children to walk or ride their bicycles to school!

PLAYGROUND RULES

GENERAL

Stay on the playground
Stay off the fences
Tag is not allowed anywhere
Students must use appropriate language
Students must wear jackets in under 60 degree weather
Throwing wood chips not allowed
Snow pants and boots must be worn in the winter months

SWINGS

One person at a time
Keep your legs from wrapping around swings
Only swing backwards and forwards
Only sitting allowed on swings

SPIDER WEBS—Grade 2 and older

No jumping off the top

No pushing or pulling others on the web climber


No bouncing the climber when others are climbing

SLIDES AND OTHER EQUIPMENT

Stay off the poles of the swing and slide equipment
Stay off the outside of the tube slides
Students must go down the slide one at a time
Students must move away from the slide immediately
Standing tricks or sliding backwards are forbidden
Students may not jump or flip from bars

DISMISSAL PROCEDURES

- Grades K-2—Garden Door
- Grades 3-5-Kindergarten Door
- Children should wait inside fence until car moves up to gate
- ALL children MUST be accompanied by an adult if walking through parking lot
 - Children must walk bicycles on school property
