Student Accomplishments

We are proud of the achievement of all of our Panthers over the last few months. Parcells 7th grade band received a 1st Division Superior Rating at MSBOA Festival, and the 7/8 Combined Orchestra received a 2nd Division Excellent Rating at MSBOA Festival. In vocal music, our 7/8 Boys Choir as well as both of our 7th and 8th Grade Girls groups received 1st Division ratings at the MSVMA festival. At the Scholastic Art Awards, four of our students were recognized for their achievements. Jacob Brook and Olivia Hutchins received Honorable Mention for their work, Chloe Harb a Silver Key, and Christopher Diamond received a Gold Key for his Digital Art. Congratulations to the Girls Basketball, Swimming, and Wrestling Teams: Our Panther Athletic Department has been busy over the last few months, with strong showings by our 7th and 8th Grade Girls Basketball, Boys Wrestling, and Swim Teams. M-Step, PSAT, NWEA Testing: Our 8th graders will being testing season with the PSAT Math and English test as well as the MSTEP Science and Social Studies tests after Spring Break. This will be the first year that the state is using the PSAT test as the benchmark test for 8th graders. At the end of the month, our 6th and 7th graders will also take the MSTEP in English and Math. Finally, all students will be tested in Reading, Math using the NWEA MAP test. These results will be used for Honors and High School placement. Please make sure that your student gets a good night's sleep, eats a healthy breakfast, and is at school on time during our testing days.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

On Sunday, March 10th, sixth grader Gruhith Yerramalli competed in the WXYZ-Scripps Regional Spelling Bee at the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History in Detroit. Seventy-four school spelling bee champions from across Wayne County took the stage attempting to earn a spot in the National Spelling Bee to take place in late May in Washington, D.C. Gru represented Parcells and our community excellently, placing fifth in a very large field of spellers. Gru spelled nine words correctly along the way, dropping out in the tenth round. He spelled "melba," "toboggan," "mercerize," "zinnia," "ersatz," "fete," "masala," "kielbasa," and "vaquero," before missing on "witloof." The Parcells community is very proud of your efforts and your achievement, Gru.

As the 3rd quarter draws to a near, the English Department continues to learn through the study of classic core novels and emphasis on writing skills that emphasize rigor and a great deal of creativity.

The 6th grade Narrative English courses are in the midst of the King Arthur unit, using the medieval tales as a way to examine common literary themes like bravery, adversity, loyalty and love. 7th grade Narrative English classes continue their reading of Avi's Charlotte Doyle. Some 8th grade classes are moving through the lengthy, Revolutionary War-era novel Chains while others continue their study of the classic Flowers for Algernon.

The 6th grade Informational/AVID classes have spent much of this quarter working on understanding and utilizing persuasive techniques. The persuasive essay is a key part of the 3rd quarter curriculum as it builds on the compare-contrast unit from January and February.

AVID students enjoyed their time at the Detroit Pistons College and College Night on March 6th. Students were able to meet and listen to inspiring speakers from Palace Sports and Entertainment, interact with representatives from area colleges and universities and then enjoy a Pistons victory over the Minnesota Timberwolves. A fun and informative evening was capped when students were able to shoot a post-game free throw on the court of Little Caesars Arena.

AVID classes are looking forward to another field trip in April, when students and staff will take a college visit to Michigan State University. Students will have lunch in the Brody Hall Cafeteria and then take a walking tour on the banks of the Red Cedar.

In closing, the English Department would like to thank John Aufdemberge for his ongoing great work here at Parcells. John has filled in more than admirably for Mr. Bens while Mr. Bens fulfills his civic duty as a juror in Detroit. Thanks Mr. Aufdemberge!

Mathematics

- **Algebra I:** Students are beginning the factoring unit. This is one of the most challenging units for students. Make sure they are keeping current with their homework.
- **Pre-Algebra:** Students just finished the systems of equations unit and will move to geometry after break.
- **Math 7:** Students are finishing the Percent unit. Next, they will begin studying Measures of Central Tendency (MCT).
- **Math 6:** Student are finishing their Variable Expressions work and then will move on to the Introduction to Algebra unit, which is focused on solving one-step equations.

Your child can get extra help Monday through Thursday after school in the homework room (room 108). NHS students from the high school along with Mrs. Rabidoux (Parcells staff) will be available to assist students.

Testing: Standardized testing begins after break. 8th graders will take the PSAT and 6th and 7th graders will take the MSTEP. All students will take the NWEA. Please make sure you child gets a good night's sleep and eats a good breakfast so they will perform at their best.

March 29th! Please make sure you are actively checking your student's Schoology and communicating with your student's teachers.

- * Move Up IEP's: Mrs. Radant and Mrs. Palffy will be meeting with 5th and 8th grade IEP teams to ease middle/high school transitions.
- * Move Up 504's: Mrs. Radant and Mrs. Palffy will be meeting with 8th grade 504 teams to ease high school transition.

Let's finish the year strong! 4th quarter starts April 9th.

- ♦ **Have your son or daughter pull up Schoology for you to review together**. If you feel you need to do this 2x a week, it may give you more time to get work in before the end of the week. This is especially helpful if your student is absent!
- Ask to see your student's homework. The cat and mouse game of "I left it at school" (school loading dock doors are open until 6pm usually from the back parking lot) and "I turned it in", delays the immediacy of being accountable for the work, and usually results in not turning in the homework or a lower grade.
- ♦ It is always better to turn in work late than not at all or turn it in 75% complete if that is all that is done. The power of a "o" destroys grades and makes it difficult to recover to a passing grade.
- Encourage your student to **communicate with their teachers**. If they are unable to do this successfully, you can teach them by helping them type an email to their teacher, perhaps copy your own email address on the communication. If students need help talking to their teacher, we can certainly coach them through this process. All middle school students should leave Parcells with the confidence to speak politely and clearly to their teachers to problem solve, as this is a vital skill for high school success.

The athletic teams are really busy with practices and games. March is the busiest time as Girls Basketball, Wrestling and club Swimming are all competing or getting ready to compete.

Girls Basketball is working hard to improve their skills on a daily basis. Both teams are carrying under 15 athletes and so that is a challenge to work with league rules due to low numbers.

Wrestling has doubled their team from last year that was 4 to 8. They will have 2 home meets on March 5 and 6 and will compete in a tournament March 16 at Fitzgerald High School.

Club swimming practices daily with meets against both Pierce and Brownell and then a Tri-meet at the end of the season.

Track will begin upon return from Spring Break so April 8, 2019. Please make sure your athlete has an updated emergency form (goldenrod paper), a current physical and is following the code of conduct for athletics.



Your Grosse Pointe Public Library

The Grosse Pointe Public School System is grateful for its many community partnerships. To ensure we remain good neighbors with our partners in the Grosse Pointe Library System, we would like to take this opportunity to remind patrons of rules that will help us all utilize this community resource to its fullest potential.

Just as in school, there are guidelines for behavior and supervision at our local libraries. The library has a document entitled "Guidelines on Behavior" that will be enforced. It is available for review at the Youth Desk, but here are a few highlights we would appreciate your help in maintaining:

Visiting the Library

- We encourage all patrons to work together in order to ensure a safe, positive learning environment.
- Loitering outside the library, or excessive entrance and exit, is disruptive to this environment which is designed to support study, reading and other quiet activities.
- Please remember the Woods branch parking lot off Mack Avenue is locked during drop-off (7:30-8:30 a.m.) and pick-up time (2:45-3:30 p.m.) for the safety of our children.
- Our libraries, particularly the Woods branch, are busiest from 3:15-5:30 p.m., so it may be helpful for other patrons to visit at non peak hours.
- Children under the age of 9 cannot be left unattended. Guardians or caregivers must be age 13 or above themselves to watch younger students in the library. The library staff is not responsible for supervision of your children. Childcare is available for a fee through the GPPSS Kids Club and details can be found at www.gpschools.org or by calling 313-432-3067.

Computer Use

- Students need a valid library card or knowledge of their card number to use computers.
- Livetutor.com is available free of charge from 3-10 p.m. every day of the week.
- Computer use is limited to 30 minutes to ensure equitable access.
- Only one student is allowed to sit at a computer.
- No food or drinks are allowed at the computer.
- Students may bring their own earphones to use with computers; the library does not provide these.
- Printing is available from youth computers for a small fee (10¢ per black and white page, \$1 for color).

Working Together

- An expired library card or excessive fees may prevent patrons from using the computers or borrowing materials.
- Any patron, including students, with a pattern of disruptive behavior will be banned from the library.
- To keep track of library usage in those busy times, student patrons will be asked to sign in for programming or quiet study using their library card.

Please remember, this is our community library. Working together, parents, students, community members, and library and school personnel will maintain a positive library environment and experience for all.
