The month of October also means that our fall testing sessions are taking place. This year, all students will take the NWEA test during their language arts and math classes. NWEA is used to track student growth and identify areas of strength or concern in both reading and math. Our 8th grade students will also be taking the PSAT. With the State of Michigan switching from ACT to SAT as the exam we administer to high school juniors, the PSAT will help us gather the necessary data to prepare our students for their college entrance exam.

Greetings from the Vice Principal

It's official! Fall is here and even though the sun is still shining nicely the cooling temperatures have started to reveal the beautiful new season! My husband and I are excited to share our home with our newest family member, Akyra. We bought her as an 8 week old puppy and she is now a 6 month old Rottweiler. As we are settling into fall – our students have done a very nice job settling into a new school year eager for new beginnings and making exciting new memories!



TARDIES: We value and protect student learning time as much as possible. One of the biggest disruptions to student learning is tardiness. You may be surprised to hear that there are actually very few students that are tardy to classes throughout the day here at Parcells and for that we celebrate! The tardies that are actually disrupting our day and getting students off to a rougher start are stemming from late arrival to school each day. We have started an "automated robocall system" here to notify parents if their child is late to school one or more classes each day. Though the early-morning buzzer of an alarm clock (or a smartphone alarm app) can be one of the worst sounds in the world to a sleepy middle school student, repeatedly muffling it via "snooze" button is never a good idea. Showing up on time to school each day benefits students' academic performance and future professional habits. Students who arrive at school early have an advantage over classmates who stumble through the door after class has begun. Consistent unexcused tardiness can mean short-term penalties and lifelong consequences. In addition to the Robocall, a lunch detention is issued for students that are tardy to class.

We believe so strongly in protecting each moment of your child's instructional time and understand that the parking lot can often times become a nightmare when dropping off students – so we offer basketball before school on Tuesday – Friday at 7:45am. We also allow students to go to our fabulous Media Center at 7:55am Tuesday – Friday or to the cafeteria to wait for school to begin.

Our late start Monday's are the culprit for most of the beginning of the day tardies. Teachers notice a difference in students that are seated in class when the bell rings compared to the students running to get to class as the bell goes off. We appreciate your support in encouraging your student to arrive to school on time every day. Please feel free to contact our attendance office (Ms. Pawlak) at 313-432-4613 or myself if you have any questions!

Assignments Completed Everytime (ACE): Our ACE program is back up and running again this year! We are excited to offer yet another proactive program that encourages every student to get their assignments in every day. If your child is missing an assignment, and doesn't turn it in after the reminder, a teacher may "ACE" them. When this happens an automated call goes home letting parents know their child has been ACED. This provides opportunity for a conversation to happen at home and the assignment can be completed that evening and turned in to ACE the following morning (Room B-2, Ms. Rabidoux). If the child does this, and there are no other outstanding assignments missing, they will not need to stay for ACE.

For students that do stay, we are excited to have several National Honor Society students from North High School that come each day to help our students if they need extra help as well as several of our own staff here at Parcells. If your child is not missing any assignments but would like to come to the ACE room (B-2) for "Homework Help" they are free to do so as long as they sign in. ACE/Homework Help are available Monday – Thursday 3:18 – 4:15pm.

If your child gets the Robocall- remember- we look at this as an opportunity to get the work completed and the learning mastered- not as a punishment!




Greetings from the Science Department

6th graders are starting the year learning about meters, liters, and grams, and how to graph what they've measured. Later this month Ms. Kefgen and Mrs. Geerer will be working with researchers from Michigan Tech, trying out the newest Next Generation Science Standards skills and activities with a special MiSTAR pilot unit on the water cycle. What's MiSTAR? It's "a new integrated science curriculum for grades 6-8 that is aligned with state and national science standards and assessments, uses a problem-based approach to stimulate students' interest, and demonstrates how science and engineering are used to develop new knowledge and innovative solutions to contemporary problems." 7th graders in Mrs. Gulyas' and Mrs. Maison's classes are also reviewing scientific method & measurement and getting back into the habit of thinking like scientists. Once we're back into 'scientist mode,' we'll be off to the world of physical science and the properties of matter.

8th grade students are reviewing the metric system and learning to create and analyze graphs using algebra skills, which will help them tremendously as they move into physics this fall. We love to remind our students that the reason we learn math is so we can do science!



Greetings from the English Department

With the first month under our belts, fall NWEA testing complete, and the summer to school transition time over, we are digging deep into curriculum. Students have been busy writing in journals and in essay format. It might be a good idea to take some time to check PINNACLE for grade updates and set up automatic notices. Also, check out the HOMEWORK CALENDAR for each teacher for weekly updates.

The English teachers in all three grades are working on an all school field trip to North High School to see the school play, Peter Pan. It promises to be an exciting performance! We can't wait to see our current students on stage with former students now attending North.

The 6th grade English department is also in the process of planning our grade level field trip to see A Christmas Carol at Meadowbrook University. Permission slips have gone home and should be returned promptly. Our goal is for everyone to attend this performance to kick start our Christmas Carol unit in English.

FROM THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT:

Great American SpellCheck Fund-Raising

This year Parcells students will again have the opportunity to participate in the Great American SpellCheck, a Scripps National Spelling Bee fund-raiser that makes sure 100% of the money raised benefits Parcells. It is rooted in academics, so it ought to be a good way for students to raise some money for our school.

Here's how it works: your child studies 50 spelling words and collects pledges from family and friends for every word that he or she spells correctly on the Great American SpellCheck 50-word test. Your child improves his or her spelling skills, and our school enjoys the financial benefits! Our goal is to raise \$1000 for English Department needs and wants, such as field trip and activities funds.

Here is the Great American SpellCheck fund-raising timeline:

Starting Tuesday, October 4: Students **study words** appearing on their Great American SpellCheck Study Words sheet, which their English teacher will provide. Also, students begin to **collect pledges** from family and friends.

Friday, October 14: deadline for returning pledge sheets to Mr. Bens in room 202

Monday, October 17 (6th grade); Wednesday, October 19 (7th grade); and Thursday, October 20 (8th grade): Great American SpellCheck test at 3:25 in room 202

Monday, October 24: Teachers send home with each participating student the student's graded test and pledge form.

Friday, November 4: deadline for students to return their pledged funds to Mr. Bens in room 202

Friday, November 11: after-school party for participants, including honoring and rewarding the top spellers and fund-raisers for each grade

Here are some ways you can help:

- Help your child learn to spell correctly the 50 Great American SpellCheck study words.
- Indicate your level of support on the Great American SpellCheck Pledge Form (attached). Also, ask family and friends to make pledges.
- Ensure that your child returns the pledge form and pledges to Mr. Bens by Friday, November 4.



Greetings from the Mathematics Department

The first month of school is over and we have successfully transitioned to a school schedule from the more relaxing summer schedule. All math classes have completed the fall NWEA testing and are now focusing on mathematics curriculum.

Many classes have already had homework assignments and a quiz or test grade. It is a good time to check Pinnacle to monitor your child's grades. Keep in mind that end of the card marking is November 4. Also, it is possible to set up automatic notifications in Pinnacle so you will be notified when grades are entered. Finally, all math teachers maintain a homework calendar where parents and students can locate the current homework assignment and be advised of any upcoming quizzes or tests.

With the math curriculum in full swing, many students benefit with a routine when solving word problems. The math teachers at Parcells teach the CUBE method and encourage students to utilize this strategy. See the graphic below. After students take the time to follow the process, the solution to the problem usually becomes clear.



Greetings from the Social Studies Department

Can you believe it's already October?! Neither can we! The Social Studies Department had a great September getting to know everyone, teaching about 9/11, and celebrating the Constitution on Constitution Day. We are loving the creativity and enthusiasm we are seeing from the students of Parcells. The 6th grade is working on their culture projects; students are researching part of their culture, writing a paper, and creating a presentation. Mr. Cooper's 7th grade students are about to test their geography knowledge by completing a test where they have to draw the whole world... from memory and with great detail! Mr. Golich's 7th graders are finishing up their geography unit and using tiered testing to assess knowledge. Our 8th grade U.S. History students are finishing up their Native American and exploration units - next up is colonial America. Students in 8th grade U.S. History worked on activities that allowed them to discover the differences in Native American tribes by region and are working on learning more about the lasting impacts of Europe-an exploration of the New World.

Our next meeting is scheduled for Thursday October 13. Weather permitting, we will be outside raking leaves and picking up trash to beautify our school.


Greetings from the Art Department

Your Grosse Pointe Public Library

The Grosse Pointe Public School System is grateful for its many community partnerships. To ensure we remain good neighbors with our partners in the Grosse Pointe Library System, we would like to take this opportunity to remind patrons of rules that will help us all utilize this community resource to its fullest potential.

Just as in school, there are guidelines for behavior and supervision at our local libraries. The library has a document entitled "Guidelines on Behavior" that will be enforced. It is available for review at the Youth Desk, but here are a few highlights we would appreciate your help in maintaining:

Visiting the Library

- We encourage all patrons to work together in order to ensure a safe, positive learning environment.
- Loitering outside the library, or excessive entrance and exit, is disruptive to this environment which is designed to support study, reading and other quiet activities.
- Please remember the Woods branch parking lot off Mack Avenue is locked during drop-off (7:30-8:30 a.m.) and pick-up time (2:45-3:30 p.m.) for the safety of our children.
- Our libraries, particularly the Woods branch, are busiest from 3:15-5:30 p.m., so it may be helpful for other patrons to visit at non peak hours.
- Children under the age of 9 cannot be left unattended. Guardians or caregivers must be age 13 or above themselves to watch younger students in the library. The library staff is not responsible for supervision of your children. Childcare is available for a fee through the GPPSS Kids Club and details can be found at www.gpschools.org or by calling 313-432-3067.

Computer Use

- Students need a valid library card or knowledge of their card number to use computers.
- Livetutor.com is available free of charge from 3-10 p.m. every day of the week.
- Computer use is limited to 30 minutes to ensure equitable access.
- Only one student is allowed to sit at a computer.
- No food or drinks are allowed at the computer.
- Students may bring their own earphones to use with computers; the library does not provide these.
- Printing is available from youth computers for a small fee (10¢ per black and white page, \$1 for color).

Working Together

- An expired library card or excessive fees may prevent patrons from using the computers or borrowing materials.
- Any patron, including students, with a pattern of disruptive behavior will be banned from the library.
- To keep track of library usage in those busy times, student patrons will be asked to sign in for programming or quiet study using their library card.

Please remember, this is our community library. Working together, parents, students, community members, and library and school personnel will maintain a positive library environment and experience for all.

GRANT AWARDED

On Monday, October 3rd, the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning awarded several law enforcement agencies in Wayne County a traffic safety grant. The grant, for \$259,000, will allow 10 local police departments to schedule special patrols to focus on impaired driving, occupant protection, red-light running, distracted driving and speed enforcement.

The Grosse Ile Police Department is the lead agency and is joined by the following police departments; Gibraltar, Southgate, Taylor, Wyandotte, Rockwood, Allen Park, Riverview, **Grosse Pointe Woods** and Huron Township.

The collection of police departments has designated October as the month to focus on speed enforcement around schools. The goal is to reduce traffic crashes along the main roads that lead to a school and combat the significant number of complaints police receive by those living in the neighborhoods that are home to a school. In addition to patrols, officers will be making contact with school districts to help educate motorists about safe driving.

Other enforcement mobilizations will include stepped up patrols around St. Patrick's Day (Impaired Driving) and Labor Day & Memorial Day (belt enforcement) amongst others.

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City of Grosse Pointe Woods Car Seat Inspection Program

Did you know that four out of every five car seats are improperly installed? Is yours one of them? Is your child riding safely? <u>WE CAN HELP!</u> The City of Grosse Pointe Woods Department of Public Safety now has two nationally certified "Child Passenger Safety Inspectors" ready to serve you! The city now offers free car seat inspections at our department by appointment only.

Want to know if your child qualifies and what seat is best suitable for your child? You can follow these simple guidelines below:

STAGE 1: Birth – Approximately 2 years

Children younger than 2 years old are best protected riding in a rear-facing car seat. Most convertible seats accommodate rear-facing up to 35 pounds.

- Seat type: infant seat (carrier with or without base) or rear-facing convertible
- In vehicle: rear-facing in the back seat, *never* in front of an active air bag
- Harness straps: at or below shoulder level
- Harness clip: always at armpit level
- Straps: snug with no slack, "pinch test"
- Angle: 45 degree recline (may use pool noodles or a tightly rolled towel to achieve this angle if need be)
- Installation: less than one inch of movement when tested at the seat belt path

When using a rear-facing convertible seat, be sure to:

- 1. Use the rear-facing seat belt path.
- 2. Make sure the seat is in the reclined position.

When to turn your child to forward-facing?

Keep your child rear-facing up to the maximum limits of the infant car seat. Children who reach these limits before 2 years old should transition to a rear-facing convertible seat. Always follow the directions from the manufacturer.

STAGE 2: Approximately 2-4 Years

Most car seat harnesses can be used until a child reaches 40 pounds, but some seat harnesses have higher weight limits. Check the label on the seat.

• Seat type: forward-facing convertible or forward-facing only combination

- In vehicle: forward-facing in the back seat
- Harness straps: at or above shoulder level
- Harness clip: always at arm pit level
- Straps: snug with no slack, "pinch test"
- Angle: check car seat owner's manual for specific requirements
- Installation: less than one inch of movement when tested at the seat belt path

When using a forward-facing convertible seat, be sure to:

- 1. Use the forward-facing seat belt path
- 2. Switch the recline adjuster to the upright position

STAGE 3: Minimum 40 lbs – 4'9"

Booster seat help protect children by lifting them so the lap and shoulder seat belt connects with their strong bones. Children should remain in a booster seat until the seat belt fits correctly without it.

- Seat type: high-back booster, no-back booster or forward-facing only combination with harness strap removed
- In vehicle: in the back seat
- Seat belt: always use a lap and shoulder belt with a booster

Use the shoulder belt adjuster if the belt touches the child's neck. It should cross the collar bone and not touch the neck or be off the shoulder.

STAGE 4: Minimum 4'9"

Your child is ready for the lap and shoulder seat belt if you can answer "yes" to each of the following questions.

- 1. Is your child 4'9" tall?
- 2. Does the lap belt sit low across the upper thighs?
- 3. Does the shoulder belt lie across the collar bone, not touching the neck and not off the shoulder?
- 4. When the child's bottom is scooted all the way back against the seat, do his or her knees bend at the edge of the seat?
- 5. Can the child stay seated that way the entire trip?
- Restraint type: lap and shoulder seat belt
- In vehicle: children younger than 13 years old always ride in the back seat

Remember Michigan law states that all children under the age of 8 OR shorter than 4'9" must be properly restrained in a child safety seat or booster seat.

All children under the age of 4 must be properly restrained in a rear seating position, if one is available.
